### **Buying Houses Together**

The largest transaction in our lives is often the purchase of our home. Unfortunately gay couples have a few more burdens than married couples to deal with. What are the implications for the surviving partner should there be a death? Married couples have the law on their side; gay couples often will have the law working against them. In addition to the planning that we should all be doing anyway (wills, etc.), there are three tasks that need to be completed in conjunction with the purchase of a house.

First, get to the attorney's office to discuss the titling of the property. Reliance on the escrow company or rules of thumb can be a major mistake. Each couples' circumstance, family and desires are unique; the best answer for you may be different from someone else's.

Second, while you're at the attorney's office, draw up a partnership agreement for the two of you. If it doesn't all work out, now is the time to decide what to do. At the beginning, no one knows whose fault any falling out might be, so the agreement will tend to be fair. The agreement should deal with such issues as ownership, tax questions and unwinding the partnership.

Third, consider how to protect each other should one partner become incapacitated or die. The easiest approach here is life insurance, but there are a lot of possible options. Losing a partner, and then losing the house later doesn't have to happen.

So increase your rewards: protect yourselves, protect your relationship and protect your investments.
